Subsections (11) through (46) are renumbered, and new subsection (11) of section 393.063 15 16 Florida Statutes, is added to the section to read: (11) "Developmental Disabilities Client" or "DD 17 client" means any individual found eligible by the 18 19 department for services under section 393.0662 of this 20 chapter. 21 $(12\frac{1}{2})$ "Developmental disability" means a disorder or 22 syndrome that is attributable to intellectual disability, 23 cerebral palsy, autism, spina bifida, Down syndrome, Phelan-McDermid syndrome, or Prader-Willi syndrome; that 24 manifests before the age of 18; and that constitutes a 25 substantial handicap that can reasonably be expected to 26 continue indefinitely. 27

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 $(1\underline{32})$ "Direct service provider" means a person 18 years of age or older who has direct face-to-face contact with a client while providing services to the client or has access to a client's living areas or to a client's funds or personal property.

- $(1\underline{43})$ "Domicile" means the place where a client legally resides and which is his or her permanent home. Domicile may be established as provided in s. 222.17. Domicile may not be established in Florida by a minor who has no parent domiciled in Florida, or by a minor who has no legal guardian domiciled in Florida, or by any alien not classified as a resident alien.
- $(1\underline{5}4)$ "Down syndrome" means a disorder caused by the presence of an extra chromosome 21.
- $(1\underline{65})$ "Express and informed consent" means consent voluntarily given in writing with sufficient knowledge and comprehension of the subject matter to enable the person giving consent to make a knowing decision without any element of force, fraud, deceit, duress, or other form of constraint or coercion.
- (176) "Family care program" means the program established in s. 393.068.
- $(1\underline{87})$ "Foster care facility" means a residential facility licensed under this chapter which provides a family living environment including supervision and care necessary to meet the physical, emotional, and social needs

of its residents. The capacity of such a facility may not be more than three residents.

- (198) "Group home facility" means a residential facility licensed under this chapter which provides a family living environment including supervision and care necessary to meet the physical, emotional, and social needs of its residents. The capacity of such a facility shall be at least 4 but not more than 15 residents.
- $(\underline{2019})$ "Guardian" has the same meaning as in s. 744.102.
- $(2\underline{1\theta})$ "Guardian advocate" means a person appointed by a written order of the court to represent a person with developmental disabilities under s. 393.12.
- $(2\underline{2}\pm)$ "Habilitation" means the process by which a client is assisted in acquiring and maintaining those life skills that enable the client to cope more effectively with the demands of his or her condition and environment and to raise the level of his or her physical, mental, and social efficiency. It includes, but is not limited to, programs of formal structured education and treatment.
- $(2\underline{32})$ "High-risk child" means, for the purposes of this chapter, a child from 3 to 5 years of age with one or more of the following characteristics:
- (a) A developmental delay in cognition, language, or physical development.

(b) A child surviving a catastrophic infectious or traumatic illness known to be associated with developmental delay, when funds are specifically appropriated.

(c) A child with a parent or guardian with developmental disabilities who requires assistance in meeting the child's developmental needs.

- (d) A child who has a physical or genetic anomaly associated with developmental disability.
- $(2\underline{43})$ "Intellectual disability" means significantly subaverage general intellectual functioning existing concurrently with deficits in adaptive behavior which manifests before the age of 18 and can reasonably be expected to continue indefinitely. For the purposes of this definition, the term:
- (a) "Adaptive behavior" means the effectiveness or degree with which an individual meets the standards of personal independence and social responsibility expected of his or her age, cultural group, and community.
- (b) "Significantly subaverage general intellectual functioning" means performance that is two or more standard deviations from the mean score on a standardized intelligence test specified in the rules of the agency.

For purposes of the application of the criminal laws and procedural rules of this state to matters relating to pretrial, trial, sentencing, and any matters relating to the imposition and execution of the death penalty, the terms "intellectual disability" or "intellectually

disabled" are interchangeable with and have the same
meaning as the terms "mental retardation" or "retardation"
and "mentally retarded" as defined in this section before
July 1, 2013.

 $(2\underline{5}4)$ "Intermediate care facility for the developmentally disabled" means a residential facility licensed and certified under part VIII of chapter 400.

- $(2\underline{65})$ "Licensee" means an individual, a corporation, a partnership, a firm, an association, a governmental entity, or other entity that is issued a permit, registration, certificate, or license by the agency. The licensee is legally responsible for all aspects of the provider operation.
- (276) "Medical/dental services" means medically necessary services that are provided or ordered for a client by a person licensed under chapter 458, chapter 459, or chapter 466. Such services may include, but are not limited to, prescription drugs, specialized therapies, nursing supervision, hospitalization, dietary services, prosthetic devices, surgery, specialized equipment and supplies, adaptive equipment, and other services as required to prevent or alleviate a medical or dental condition.
- (287) "Personal care services" means individual assistance with or supervision of essential activities of daily living for self-care, including ambulation, bathing, dressing, eating, grooming, and toileting, and other

similar services that are incidental to the care furnished and essential to the health, safety, and welfare of the client if no one else is available to perform those services.

- (298) "Phelan-McDermid syndrome" means a disorder caused by the loss of the terminal segment of the long arm of chromosome 22, which occurs near the end of the chromosome at a location designated q13.3, typically leading to developmental delay, intellectual disability, dolicocephaly, hypotonia, or absent or delayed speech.
- (3029) "Prader-Willi syndrome" means an inherited condition typified by neonatal hypotonia with failure to thrive, hyperphagia or an excessive drive to eat which leads to obesity usually at 18 to 36 months of age, mild to moderate intellectual disability, hypogonadism, short stature, mild facial dysmorphism, and a characteristic neurobehavior.
- $(3\underline{10})$ "Relative" means an individual who is connected by affinity or consanguinity to the client and who is 18 years of age or older.
- $(3\underline{2}\underline{+})$ "Resident" means a person who has a developmental disability and resides at a residential facility, whether or not such person is a client of the agency.
- 157 (332) "Residential facility" means a facility

 158 providing room and board and personal care for persons who

 159 have developmental disabilities.

 $(3\underline{43})$ "Residential habilitation" means supervision and training with the acquisition, retention, or improvement in skills related to activities of daily living, such as personal hygiene skills, homemaking skills, and the social and adaptive skills necessary to enable the individual to reside in the community.

- (354) "Residential habilitation center" means a community residential facility licensed under this chapter which provides habilitation services. The capacity of such a facility may not be fewer than nine residents. After October 1, 1989, new residential habilitation centers may not be licensed and the licensed capacity for any existing residential habilitation center may not be increased.
- $(3\underline{65})$ "Respite service" means appropriate, short-term, temporary care that is provided to a person who has a developmental disability in order to meet the planned or emergency needs of the person or the family or other direct service provider.
- $(3\underline{76})$ "Restraint" means a physical device, method, or drug used to control dangerous behavior.
- (a) A physical restraint is any manual method or physical or mechanical device, material, or equipment attached or adjacent to an individual's body so that he or she cannot easily remove the restraint and which restricts freedom of movement or normal access to one's body.
- (b) A drug used as a restraint is a medication used to control the person's behavior or to restrict his or her

freedom of movement and is not a standard treatment for the person's medical or psychiatric condition. Physically holding a person during a procedure to forcibly administer psychotropic medication is a physical restraint.

- (c) Restraint does not include physical devices, such as orthopedically prescribed appliances, surgical dressings and bandages, supportive body bands, or other physical holding necessary for routine physical examinations and tests; for purposes of orthopedic, surgical, or other similar medical treatment; to provide support for the achievement of functional body position or proper balance; or to protect a person from falling out of bed.
- (387) "Seclusion" means the involuntary isolation of a person in a room or area from which the person is prevented from leaving. The prevention may be by physical barrier or by a staff member who is acting in a manner, or who is physically situated, so as to prevent the person from leaving the room or area. For the purposes of this chapter, the term does not mean isolation due to the medical condition or symptoms of the person.
- (398) "Self-determination" means an individual's freedom to exercise the same rights as all other citizens, authority to exercise control over funds needed for one's own support, including prioritizing these funds when necessary, responsibility for the wise use of public funds, and self-advocacy to speak and advocate for oneself in

order to gain independence and ensure that individuals with a developmental disability are treated equally.

- (4039) "Significant additional need" means an additional need for medically necessary services which would place the health and safety of the client, the client's caregiver, or the public in serious jeopardy if it is not met. The term does not exclude services for an additional need that the client requires in order to remain in the least restrictive setting, including, but not limited to, employment services and transportation services. The agency may provide additional funding only after the determination of a client's initial allocation amount and after the qualified organization has documented the availability of nonwaiver resources.
- $(4\underline{10})$ "Specialized therapies" means those treatments or activities prescribed by and provided by an appropriately trained, licensed, or certified professional or staff person and may include, but are not limited to, physical therapy, speech therapy, respiratory therapy, occupational therapy, behavior therapy, physical management services, and related specialized equipment and supplies.
- $(4\underline{21})$ "Spina bifida" means a medical diagnosis of spina bifida cystica or myelomeningocele.
- $(4\underline{32})$ "Support coordinator" means an employee of a qualified organization as provided in s. 393.0663 designated by the agency to assist individuals and families in identifying their capacities, needs, and resources, as

well as finding and gaining access to necessary supports and services; coordinating the delivery of supports and services; advocating on behalf of the individual and family; maintaining relevant records; and monitoring and evaluating the delivery of supports and services to determine the extent to which they meet the needs and expectations identified by the individual, family, and others who participated in the development of the support plan.

- $(4\underline{43})$ "Supported employment" means employment located or provided in an integrated work setting, with earnings paid on a commensurate wage basis, and for which continued support is needed for job maintenance.
- $(4\underline{5}4)$ "Supported living" means a category of individually determined services designed and coordinated in such a manner as to provide assistance to adult clients who require ongoing supports to live as independently as possible in their own homes, to be integrated into the community, and to participate in community life to the fullest extent possible.
- $(4\underline{65})$ "Training" means a planned approach to assisting a client to attain or maintain his or her maximum potential and includes services ranging from sensory stimulation to instruction in skills for independent living and employment.

272	(1) PROGRAM IMPLEMENTATION
273	(a) The Agency for Persons with Disabilities shall
274	develop and implement the Adult Pathways Home and Community
275	Services Medicaid Waiver as a fee for service model with an
276	annual per person funding cap to address needs for DD
277	clients as they transition into adulthood and achieve
278	greater independence throughout their lifetime.
279	(b) The waiver shall create an additional pathway to
280	contain cost and provide necessary supports and services
281	maximizing the use of natural supports and community
282	partnerships before utilizing state resources to meet
283	varying levels of need at the earliest moment possible to
284	prevent crisis and to influence outcomes relating to
285	health, safety, and well-being.
286	(c) The Agency for Health Care Administration, in
287	partnership with the Agency for Persons with Disabilities,
288	may seek federal approval through a state plan amendment or
289	Medicaid waiver as necessary to implement the program. The
290	Agency for Health Care Administration shall submit a

291	request for federal approval needed to implement the
292	program by November 1, 2024.
293	(2) ELIGIBILITY; VOLUNTARY ENROLLMENT; DISENROLLMENT
294	(a) Participation in this Adult Pathways waiver is
295	voluntary and limited to the maximum number of enrollees
296	specified in the General Appropriations Act.
297	(b) The Agency for Persons with Disabilities shall
298	approve a needs assessment methodology to determine
299	functional, behavioral, and physical needs of prospective
300	enrollees. The assessment methodology may be administered
301	by persons who have completed training offered by the
302	Agency for Persons with Disabilities. Eligibility to
303	participate in the Adult Pathways waiver is determined
304	based on all of the following criteria:
305	1. Whether the individual is eligible for Medicaid.
306	2. Whether the individual is 21 years of age or at the
307	point of attainment of a high school diploma and currently
308	in a pre-enrollment category for iBudget waiver services
309	under chapter 393 and meets the current criteria of
310	categories 7, 6, or 5.
311	3. Whether the individual meets the level of care for
312	home and community-based services as identified in the
313	approved federal waiver.
314	(a) Participation in this Adult Pathways waiver will
315	not affect current enrollees on the iBudget waiver unless
316	an enrollee, or their legal representative, declares an
317	intent to voluntarily disenroll from the iBudget waiver.

318	(b) Enrollees who voluntarily disenroll from the Adult
319	Pathways waiver may be afforded the opportunity to return
320	to the most appropriate pre-enrollment category based on a
321	current needs assessment and individual criteria.
322	(3) ADULT PATHWAYS WAIVER BENEFITS.—
323	(a) The Agency for Persons with Disabilities shall
324	authorize covered services as specified in the Adult
325	Pathways waiver that are medically necessary and may
326	include the following service offerings:
327	1. Adult Day Training.
328	2. Companion Services.
329	3. Employment Services.
330	4. Personal Supports.
331	5. Prevocational Services.
332	6. Supported Living Coaching.
333	7. Transportation.
334	(b) Services must be provided to enrollees in
335	accordance with an individualized care plan which is
336	evaluated and updated at least annually and as warranted by
337	changes in the enrollee's circumstances.
338	(4) PROGRAM ADMINSTRATION AND EVALUATION.—
339	(a) The Agency for Persons with Disabilities shall
340	begin enrollment upon federal approval, with coverage for
341	enrollees becoming effective upon authorization and
342	availability of sufficient state and federal resources.
343	(b) Nothing in this section or in any administrative
344	rule shall be construed to prevent or limit the Agency for
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345	Health Care Administration, in consultation with the Agency
346	for Persons with Disabilities, from adjusting fees,
347	reimbursement rates, lengths of stay, number of visits, or
348	number of services, or from limiting enrollment, or making
349	any other adjustment necessary to comply with the
350	availability of moneys and any limitations or directions

352	(c) The Agency for Health Care Administration, in
